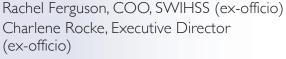

A+ for Urgent Care at The Vic!



The Vic's Emergency Centre transitioned to an Urgent Care Centre last October, providing treatment for unexpected but non-life-threatening health concerns 24 hours a day seven day a week.

"Our Urgent Care Centre provides coordinated and focused care for individuals with injuries or illnesses that require immediate attention," says Dr. Carey Kuo, Medical Site Director of Urgent Care. "Our goals are to provide the best care possible and ensure a safe and comfortable experience at The Vic."

In the following six-month period, wait times in The Vic's Urgent Care improved by 29 per cent — decreasing from an average 2.12 hours to 1.5 hours. The number of patients accessing Urgent Care has increased by 28 per cent, with an average 112 patients using Urgent Care each day compared to an average 88 per day last year.

In October, patients in Urgent Care were surveyed and overwhelmingly reported positive experiences:

97% rated their care positively

99% rated the courtesy and respect of The Vic staff positively

95% rated the information they received about their health concern and care positively

98% said they would return to The Vic's Urgent Care if they or their family needed care

"The new system worked for me — I arrived at 8:30 a.m. and was talking to a physician before 9 a.m. The tests I needed were completed swiftly to support diagnosis and treatment. I was treated efficiently, compassionately and respectfully by the nurses, doctor, technicians and porters, I was well-cared for and got just the help I needed."

Victoria Lifeline Volunteers Receive Premier's Volunteer Service Award

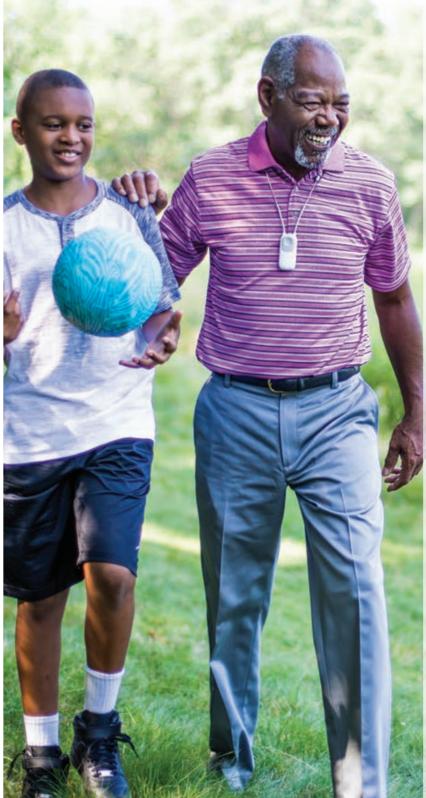


Victoria Lifeline volunteers were honoured for their extraordinary dedication to helping Manitobans lead safe and independent lives at the 35th Annual Volunteer Awards on April 19th. They received the prestigious Premier's Volunteer Service Award, which recognizes the commitment demonstrated by outstanding volunteers across the province.

Our dedicated Victoria Lifeline volunteers contribute an incredible 4,000 hours annually to Victoria Lifeline, a community service of The Vic Foundation.

Victoria Lifeline celebrates 30 years of safe and independent living

Victoria Lifeline installed their very first client on May 18, 1988. He was an 84-year-old gentleman named Murray who immediately felt more confident with a Lifeline help button. When interviewed about Lifeline all those years ago, Murray declared, "If anything happened, I know I could reach out and touch someone."



Thirty years later Victoria Lifeline is providing that same peace of mind to over 5,600 people across the province in more than 370 communities. From the early days of a push-style help button that only worked in the subscriber's home, Victoria Lifeline now offers fall detection technology and GPS enabled mobile help buttons where clients can access emergency assistance wherever they need it.

Louise Horst was Lifeline's first Program Manager back in 1988 and she remembers Murray and his wife, very well. "He'd fallen, and his wife was unable to help him off the floor. They made the decision to get Lifeline after that and we were happy to provide caregiver support to his wife." Back then, there was a negative stigma attached to wearing a help button, so Louise and her staff had to demonstrate the value of the service. Their message still resonates today, "Victoria Lifeline has a holistic approach; we care for the individual and the caregiver, we also assist healthcare professionals and emergency services. We really are there for the whole community, keeping friends, neighbours and loved ones safe," Louise explained.

Since then, Victoria Lifeline has helped more than 40,000 people in Manitoba lead safe and independent lives. That's an incredible milestone for an organization that had 68 subscribers at the end of their first year. Communications Officer Krystal Stokes attributes that success to their long-standing mission: to support individuals who value independence by providing a quality, caring service. "We also have community champions," Krystal remarked, "like our amazing volunteers who install and service Victoria Lifeline, healthcare providers who refer clients to us when they see a need and testimonials from subscribers who love our service."

Through their partnership with Philips Lifeline, Victoria Lifeline offers the most advanced medical alert devices on the market today. Reliable, state-of-the-art equipment and the in-home set-up by a trained installer are two more reasons why Victoria Lifeline is the number one medical alert service in Manitoba.

So where does Victoria Lifeline see themselves in the next 30 years? Technology has the potential to change the way people age and Victoria Lifeline is poised on the edge of innovation. "This is where it gets really exciting," Krystal said, "thirty years ago we couldn't have imagined a mobile help button that could locate the subscriber and provide two-way communication, but now we have GoSafe. We can't wait to see what the future holds and how we might harness that technology to help our clients."

Caring for the Community

You already know that Victoria Lifeline is a community service of The Vic Foundation, and that its #1 medical alert service has been keeping our family, friends and neighbours safe for 30 years. But what you may not know is that Victoria Lifeline also subsidizes thousands of low-income Manitobans who could not afford a Lifeline of their own.

Caring for the most vulnerable people in the community is one of our core values: Be empathetic & inclusive - We understand that there are many determinants of healthy living, and that our community is home to a diverse ethnic, economic and aging community with at-risk populations. We will focus on better outcomes by targeting root causes of their health disparities so that we can improve the health and well-being of all members of our community.

The Victoria Lifeline Subsidy Program was first introduced in 1994 based on the philosophy that anyone who needs this potentially life-saving service should have access to it regardless of age, ability or income. Over the last 24 years, Lifeline has subsidized clients whose incomes fell below the poverty line. Many of our subsidy clients are seniors living on a fixed income, who want to remain in their own homes, but need the support of a medical alarm to stay independent. Many others live with chronic or debilitating health conditions, but they all share the same goal — to live with dignity on their own terms, in their own homes.

Since its inception, the program has also had a positive impact on Lifeline's staff and volunteers. Communications Officer Krystal Stokes oversees the program and she fondly recalls a client she worked with four years ago. "This was a young man living with a traumatic brain injury who was unable to work. He was fiercely independent, and I was in awe of his determination and incredible spirit. His injury put him at risk for falling, and through the program, we were able to provide him with a medical alarm that had fall detection, which gave both him and the people who loved him, peace of mind."

To qualify for the subsidy program, clients must fill out an application and submit their latest Notice of Assessment from Revenue Canada. If their taxable income is \$16,000/year or less, they will automatically qualify. Subsidized rates are available for the standard service, fall detection, and the wireless communicator for people who don't have a traditional landline.

Regional Mental Health consolidates at The Vic, paving the way for specialized treatment and services for patients and families.

Often invisible, mental illness is one of the most pervasive health issues of our time. It touches all of us, whether we experience our own struggle, or support family and friends through theirs. Estimates are that as many as one in five Canadians will experience mental health difficulties at some point during their lifetime.

To better serve those experiencing mental health challenges in our community, preparations are underway to consolidate services from other regional sites including the Grace and Seven Oaks Hospitals and expand adult mental health services at The Vic.

"The consolidation of services along with a significant increase in the number of psychiatrists at The Vic will ensure more uniform and coordinated care, improving and expanding the mental health care and services we can provide to patients suffering from mental illness and their families." says Dr. Sherief El-Gaaly, Medical Site Director of Mental Health. "As part of the expansion, The Vic will also become the regional site for the delivery of inpatient geriatric psychiatry which will help us to better meet the needs of our aging community."



This major undertaking will see the transformation of three floors at The Vic devoted to inpatient mental health care to accommodate the increase of inpatient beds from 21 to 75. Specialized and therapeutic spaces will also be created for the safety, comfort and treatment of patients. The main floor will also be upgraded for the delivery of out-patient services. Renovations are scheduled to be completed later this year.
