The Victoria General Hospital is proud to serve an ever-growing south Winnipeg population with high quality health care services. Today, The Vic is a 195-bed acute care facility that offers a wide range of inpatient and outpatient services including internal medicine, family medicine, surgery, endoscopy, cardiology, gynecology and bariatric care. We strive to provide these services with dignity, care and compassion.

This past year has been an exciting time of change, and I am happy to share some highlights of what our team has accomplished to advance healthcare at The Vic and in our community.

Last summer, our community services expanded with the opening of a new primary care clinic in ACCESS Fort Garry at 135 Plaza Drive.

Donor-funded equipment makes world-class surgery technique possible!

The Vic has become the first hospital in Manitoba and only the fifth in Canada to offer a new colorectal surgery technique for complex rectal diseases. The new procedure, called Transanal Total Mesorectal Excision (TATME), combines the proven methods of laparoscopy and Transanal Endoscopic Microsurgery (TEM) and the benefits of both which include less pain, fewer complications and faster recovery times to improve the patient experience.

"It is a natural marriage of technology," said The Vic's Medical Director of Surgery Dr. David Hochman. "We are bringing new, state-of-the-art techniques to Manitoba."

This combination of laparoscopy and TEM also increases the likelihood that gastrointestinal continuity can be restored and a permanent colostomy can be avoided. To date, only 1,000 of these surgeries have been performed worldwide.

This new technique would not be available for patients at The Vic without the generous support of our donors. Two special donors in our community funded the TEM and have given close to \$190,000 over the years to advance healthcare at The Vic. The support of our donors also enabled The Vic Foundation to invest more than \$1 million in state-of-the-art technological upgrades to two surgery suites, allowing for innovative procedures like TEM and TATME to be performed. These upgrades also created a highly-efficient environment for staff and increased The Vic's ability to attract and retain the best and brightest surgeons to advance healthcare in our community.

Advancing Healthcare at The Vic

Major Makeover to the 5th Floor Medical Units

The Vic's 5th floor Medicine Units provide care for patients with pneumonia, respiratory and cardiac conditions. All patient rooms, nursing stations and corridors on these Units are being upgraded to improve patient care and to accommodate new technologies for greater staff efficiencies.

Bright lighting, new flooring and fresh paint have transformed these Units into a welcoming and restorative environment.

"Enhancements will result in a better patient care experience and a safer environment for patients, families and staff," said Unit 5 South Manager of Patient Care Kurt Pay.

These improvements mark the first major makeover to this floor since The Vic opened its doors on Pembina Highway in 1971. Upgrades are scheduled to be completed this summer.







Investing in Pancreatic Cancer Research

Pancreatic cancer is a relatively rare disease, with 181 patients diagnosed in Manitoba in 2013 (Source: CancerCare Manitoba). Patient prognosis is often poor; approximately 80% of pancreatic cancer diagnoses are advanced (Source: National Cancer Institute).

Most patients receiving chemotherapy treatment for advanced pancreatic cancer experience some degree of peripheral neuropathy (numbness, tingling and pain) during treatment. There is a potential for the peripheral neuropathy to become permanent. When a patient develops neuropathy, the healthcare team may decide it's not safe for a patient to continue treatment, or the patient may decide to stop treatment.

The Vic Foundation is partnering with the Manitoba Medical Service Foundation (MMSF) to invest \$28,000 in new research to explore the link between advanced pancreatic cancer treatment and peripheral neuropathy.

Dr. Christina Kim, a highly-skilled medical oncologist at The Vic's Buhler Cancer Centre and CancerCare Manitoba, is embarking on a new study to assess changes in patients with advanced pancreatic cancer during treatment. The study will be coordinated by the Victoria Institute of Clinical Research & Evaluation.

"There are currently two first-line chemotherapy treatment options for advanced pancreatic cancer," said Dr. Kim. "New research may ultimately help us to determine the ideal therapy, ideal dosage and help in preventing toxicity in patients with advanced pancreatic cancer. Once complete, the results from this study will give us important information that will help us in collaborating with other centers across Canada for a larger cohort study."

Recently transformed to include a cozy fireplace, comfortable seating area and large windows overlooking a Miracle Garden, the Solarium is a tranquil space for cancer patients to reflect, unwind and support each other.

The new Solarium is also a permanent, neighbourhood home for the delivery of the national Look Good Feel Better® program for women battling cancer. Look Good Feel Better® helps women cancer patients manage the often-traumatic, appearance-related effects of surgeries and chemotherapy treatments. Through free workshops on skin care, makeup, wigs and head-covering techniques, women can look and feel more like themselves, giving them hope, confidence and strength to fight their disease. "Cancer patients must deal with tremendous obstacles and the ability to take control of some portion of their treatment is important," says Connie Gray, Program Volunteer.

Originally born out of the generous support of Dr. and Mrs. Chandulal Shah, East India Company, the Mehra Family and the Guild of the Victoria General Hospital, the new Solarium meets the advanced healthcare needs of our community. "I have experienced first-hand the gratitude from patients utilizing the Solarium," says Connie. "Everyone leaves a workshop with a smile on their face and often a hug on the way out. Participants appreciate the connection and support from other women experiencing many of the same treatments and side effects, and friendships are often formed."

Meet Dave Simpson

Victoria Lifeline Home Service Rep

Dave is both a Victoria Lifeline client and volunteer. He spends one day a week servicing the medical alert equipment for clients across Winnipeg.

It was because of his volunteer role as a Home Service Rep that Dave saw first-hand the value of a personal help button. Dave lives alone, and after hip surgery in 2012 he decided to be proactive and protect himself in case of a fall or medical emergency. "I thought, what happens if I go down to the basement to do laundry or change the furnace filter and something happens. No one would hear my calls for help."

Dave recalls installing Victoria Lifeline for a client who was on the floor of her apartment for three days after a fall without food, water and access to a bathroom, "Victoria Lifeline is just like life insurance" explained Dave. "You may not need it 99% of the time, but with a push of a button, it's there when you do." Accidents can happen to anyone.

Dave, a retired Canada Safeway Production Coordinator, has volunteered for different organizations for over 40 years; it's who he is. "Giving back to my community is rewarding" said Dave. As a Victoria Lifeline volunteer, Dave now helps others in his community live safely and independently at home.

Dave was recently awarded a Manitoba Council on Aging Volunteer Service Recognition Certificate for his work with Victoria Lifeline, and the staff could not be prouder of Dave and his accomplishments.
